ART DISCOVERY

MIRACULOUS DISCOVERY FROM 80 YEARS AGO

Some months ago, Mr James, a teacher at the Clunes Primary School found an old folder of artwork sitting on a shelf in one of the rooms near the library. Upon opening the envelope he was extremely surprised to find it contained several A3 Cardboard sheets of vividly coloured artwork that looked very old. Further investigation showed they were dated 1943! How they have survived all these years is unknown.

The discovered work was produced by 'Jack Spark' a student at the school during the 1940s when it was known as the Clunes Elementary School. Jack would have been about 13 years of age and was the grandson of John Spark, a local butcher who started his shop in Clunes in the 1890s. There would still be locals well acquainted with Jack's brother, Fred Spark.

Mr James and colleague, Liz Garth, decided the artwork should be returned to Jack Spark's descendants and set about finding out more. Peter Spark, a parent of a current student and Secretary/Volunteer of the Clunes Museum was able to contact Rod Spark, Jack's son and organised for the items to be returned to the family.

Rod was excited by the discovery and very impressed with his father's work from 80 years ago. He decided to keep two of the pieces to display at his own house and graciously donated the remainder to the school. The school's 175th anniversary is fast approaching, and very few documents have survived in the school archives from throughout its history.


On behalf of Rod, Peter handed over the remaining artwork to the school along with a generous donation of eight schoolbooks, recently found in the old Spark butcher shop on Fraser Street, and also dated from the 1940s.

This detailed schoolwork showcases a beautiful display of the curriculum for the period when stability and safety were chiefs concerns during World War Two, even in Clunes.

These pieces of artwork and schoolbooks will hopefully be displayed at the school for all to see and will be a wonderful addition showcasing its long history in Clunes.

CLUNES CEMETERY UPDATE

Did you know that our cemetery is the final resting place for almost 6000 people?

Established in 1861, 10 years after the first gold discovery in Clunes, it was given the first Parliamentary Act to establish and manage cemeteries in Victoria. Clunes was one of the early cemeteries to be designated when this passed into law in 1854.

Today, only about twelve people each year are interred with some burials in the original monumental sections (Church of England, Methodist, Presbyterian, Catholic) or the comparatively recently-established non-denominational Garden Section. Four Memorial Walls accommodate those who prefer cremation.

Like all cemeteries and crematoria in Victoria, Clunes is operated under the Cemeteries and Crematoria Act 2003 and administered by the Victorian Department of Health. Under the Act, cemeteries are divided into two main groups, Class A and Class B. Class A are large cemeteries (or a group of cemeteries) e.g. Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong and Greater Melbourne. All other cemeteries are designated Class B, which includes Clunes.

The day-to-day administration and operation of a Class B cemetery is managed by a Cemetery Trust. The Trust consists of between three and 11 citizens of the community recommended by the Health Minister and appointed (and may be reappointed) by the Governor of Victoria for a period of five years. As vacancies occur on the Trust, the Department will run advertisements in local media for interested persons to apply for a position. Two recent applicants have now been appointed by the Governor, with the Clunes Cemetery Trust now complete with 11 members consisting of four women and seven men in voluntary unpaid positions.

The Trust is responsible for the provision of cemetery services to the community and to maintain the cemetery. The Trust is accountable to the Minister for Health for its performance and must comply with Government policy and guidelines. Obviously, it is also ultimately accountable to its community. All interments in the Clunes cemetery are perpetual and, unlike other larger cemeteries running out of land, not all of the land in Clunes cemetery has been developed, so there remains plenty of scope well into the future. The cemetery is not easy area to maintain and the risk of fire always poses a risk. There is no water or power connected to the cemetery; both remain out of contention for financial reasons.

All work carried out at the cemetery is completed by Trust members, except for some contractors for major projects. We are very privileged to have help from several citizens who volunteer their services helping out on working bees. It is important to remember that the Trust is not responsible for the condition of individual graves or memorials, unless they are likely to become a danger to the public or other memorials, in which case they can be returned to a safe condition. The upkeep of memorials remains the responsibility of the family and descendants.

The Trust may apply for grant funding from the Department and other government and corporate institutions. Recently, the Trust successfully secured three grants: one from Bendigo Bank (Creswick) and two from the Department. The Trust has also benefitted by the generosity of the National Hotel and the unfortunate closure of the Clunes Probus Club.

After several improvements over recent years, one project which the Trust wants to pursue is the renovation of the old chapel. While in most people's minds, it's a place where we say goodbye to a loved one, it's also remains a place that is very much part of life, immense history, and an important window to our past.

On behalf of the Trust, I would invite members of the community to visit your cemetery.



SOMETHING FOR YOU

AND THE PLACE WHERE YOU LIVE

Where people live and work together, you will always find volunteering. Across all cultures, including First Nations, giving time or skills to achieve a shared purpose has added meaning to people's lives and contributed to community life for thousands of years.

Nothing has changed. These two key tenets (self and community) remain central to volunteering today. In the 19th century the emergence of community organisations added a formality to volunteering that has shaped our expectations for volunteering experience.

This experience can include an enquiry or call out for volunteers, a role to fulfil, an induction, regular hours (or, more recently, just a specific project or event to tackle), or a connection with others to support what the organisation's values as a way of giving time or skills.

"COVID interrupted volunteering as we all knew it so, last year, Clunes formed a project called 'Volunteering Local' to rebuild our town's capacity through volunteering," Clunes Neighbourhood House Manager Lana de Kort said.

Where to Find Volunteering Opportunities?

www.volunteeringlocal.org involved the creation of a website where people could go to find local volunteering opportunities. Funded by the Victorian Government, Department of Families, Fairness and Housing (and further supported by the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal), the project helped promote the website with signage, promotional material for the pilot groups and a range of promotional events including a pop-up showcasing community volunteering and, last month, the Family Fun Day that marked the launch of Clunes Neighbourhood House moving into the Former Clunes Free Lending Library building.

"At www.volunteeringlocal.org you can search by organisation or role and the website will connect you directly to the right person at the relevant group," Lana said. "The project involves five pilot organisations who represent a cross-section of what is available in town: the Clunes Football and Netball Club, Clunes Tourist & Development Association, Clunes Museum, Creative Clunes and Clunes Neighbourhood House."

"We work with these groups to make sure we developed a referral point [website] that works for diverse groups. Every group in town, whether they are a formal organisation or not, can promote opportunities there."

"Being a part of this project has helped the club attract people to key roles, such as our Canteen," CFNC's Kath Milne said.

"It's also helped us think about how we welcome people into our club, and, in some ways, this been the most important outcome."

Finding your Tribe – Culture Match

"Attracting and retaining volunteers is a big part of the accepted language around volunteering," Lana explained.

"The number of volunteers you have influences what you can achieve, so being able to attract volunteers, and then keep them, has become the standard measure for volunteering success. But doing this well involves more than just a call out for people to put their hands up. It involves helping people belong."

Finding your tribe and contributing to an activity or outcome that is valued by them makes you feel acknowledged, supported and, frankly, not alone. Belonging, and the social ties that nurtures, helps people manage stress and build resilience at a personal level, but also helps the group they are contributing to. It helps everyone perform at their very best."

"The Volunteering Local project delivered on its outcomes at the end of last month. We now have an opportunity to build on this asset and work together to explore how we can strengthen belonging and make Clunes an even stronger community."



🛞 🕞 🖨 VNI WEST REPORT

We encourage the community to make a submission on the latest report into the Victoria New South Wales Interconnector West (VNI West) project. We are pleased to see the terminal station proposed for Mount Prospect in our Shire is no longer the preferred option, but note that it remains an option.

We have concerns that:

- The proposed route of the Western Renewables Link transmission line through Hepburn Shire remains largely unchanged.
- The report recommends an increase in the overhead transmission lines from 220kV (kilovolt) to 500kV along the section of the Western Renewables Link from Mount Prospect through our Shire, which require significantly larger towers.
- The undergrounding of power lines has not been considered.
