The store opened about eighteen months ago, adding to the collection of shops and businesses at the western end of Fraser Street. With its fully restored double-fronted storefront, Mode offers a glimpse of old Clunes in its heyday. Locals and visitors alike can't help but appreciate the effort gone into reviving one the town's best examples of Victorian era retail premises. The restoration work inside makes stepping into Mode truly feels like entering another time.

It's a distinct pleasure to browse Mode's collection of clothing apparel, soft furnishings, and unique giftware. Business owner, Sam, who has a long history in fashion, brings contemporary styling and design to her elegant displays and choice of goods on offer. The store stocks locally-made products (as well as displaying works by local artists), sells Australian and New Zealand brands, and has many beautiful and unusual items from Europe. If you love fashion and design, Mode will delight you at every turn. It might seem strange to call this a department store, given its size, and yet once you enter and look around at the variety of goods on offer, that's clearly what it is. More than a clothing shop, it offers décor and furnishings, and even a cabinet of curios. There are so many tiny, exquisite things lining the shelves and on display within the restored glass and timber-framed counter. Sam is always searching for something different and her eye for difference and detail runs through the shop, informing all her choices.

Why shouldn't Clunes have a fabulous little department store? Sam asked herself before beginning the restoration project. And that's just what Mode has given us.

Does the local community benefit from the festival? Many local businesses benefit from the 12,000 visitors. Local accommodation is booked out.

Clunes and District Young Farmers are paid for toilet facility cleaning.

Clunes Agricultural Society are paid for security services. Attitude benefits from bar profits.

Three local businesses provide catering.

Local cafes are paid to provide coffee and some meals to volunteers.

GET YOUR What's on in clunes guide

Attitude – Ageing Well in Clunes has released a new pocket-sized community activities guide. The What's on in Clunes guide aims to increase participation in the social, creative, cultural and physical activities run at Attitude for older residents and retirees, with many events also likely to appeal to people of all ages.

What's on in Clunes will also provide free listings of special events run by Clunes groups. It will be published quarterly and distributed through local shops and cafes, the heath service, the Warehouse and through the Neighbourhood House, and its Open House Meals service.

We will also be reinvigorating local notice boards around town and have a new poster series to promote individual events.

The expanded program and publication of the guide is the first key initiative of the pioneering partnership Attitude has entered with Clunes Neighbourhood House and the Central Highlands Rural Health Service. The three partners have joined forces as part of the Ageing and Living Well in Hepburn Project, supported by the Western Victoria Private Health Network under the Australian Government's Primary Health Program Network.

The partners will work together to assist older people to live active and full lives in their community. The initial focus is on Clunes, with plans to extend to Daylesford, Trentham and Creswick. It's a 12-month project, but we are hoping that what we set up can continue.

As part of the project, Attitude recently met with representatives of other local community and sporting groups and we have all committed to continue to come together throughout the year to share our knowledge, concerns and resources, where we can, to help keep our town strong.

TRANSPORT IDEAS

It will come as no surprise that the ability to drive or use transport to get around is one of the top priorities for people as they get older. This concern is even higher in rural areas like Clunes where access to public transport or taxi services is limited at best.

Living and ageing well at home means being able to get to social activities, do shopping, go to appointments, volunteer and/or work, and just generally live your life. But it's hard when your health deteriorates, you don't have access to a car, you lose your partner and don't drive, or countless other reasons.

One feature of the Living and Ageing Well in Hepburn project that has recently been funded in Clunes by the Western Victoria Primary Health Network under the Australian Government's Primary Health Networks program, is the development and trialing of a transport service.

We know this service will include access to a bus (thank you, Central Highlands Rural Health) to support activities for older people; but we also think it could have other applications. It might help people get from A to B throughout the course of their day. It might link people to the medical appointment car offered by the health service. It might involve volunteers, or could possibly be developed so it's a sustainable venture after the funding. Who knows?



School of Mines Building – History of the Club House

We have been looking into the history of the club building over the break and found the following information in the club and the Museum's archives.

The building was specifically built for the training of metallurgy by the Victorian Quartz Mining industry. It was needed for the survival of the gold crushing mills and extraction foundries which was important to the mining industry and the development of Clunes.

The small timber building with red brick retort furnaces and chimneys is located along the banks of the Creswick Creek in Clunes. The Clunes branch of the Ballarat School of Mines' building was opened on Friday February 5, 1892.

When the building opened 22 students were enrolled in mining sciences and another 20 in 'other' subjects. At the end of the second term in 1893 it was formally closed after operating for less than two years.

The School of Mines Building has been used for many different community groups over the years including The Australian Natives Association, Clunes branch No 12 (1912-?), The Clunes Branch of the Country Women's Association (1935-?), and the Eygelaar Inner Spring Mattress Factory commenced operating from 1951 to 1955.

Building restoration/ works took place in 1955- 1958 and again in 1962.


The Clunes Borough Council established an Infant Welfare Centre in 1957 running until 1995 with an Infant Welfare Sister attending for half a day each week. Since 1995, it's been home to the The Clunes Angling club 1995.


