- Community advocacy in matters affecting Clunes and its citizens

# **BOOKTOWN 2023**

The Booktown Festival returns on new dates this year and will be held on the last weekend of March (Saturday 25 & Sunday 26 March). A new look Booktown Festival will take advantage of the autumn weather running from dawn to dark over two days.

The Booktown program has been extended to look at the many ways we tell stories – through books, film, music, theatre, songwriting, photography, and other visual arts, even the houses we make. This year will also feature first-hand stories arising out of ageing, small town crime, imagining other worlds, land management, women's business, and so much more.

The festival will continue to celebrate every aspect of the book – not just writing and reading – but making, illustrating, publishing, retailing, and sharing. Along with books on display and for sale, you'll find conversations with writers, storytellers, renowned authors, poets and wordsmiths. Head to the Booktown Festival website at clunesbooktown.com.au to see the program.

For the local artists and visitors there will also be a program of art form story crafting conversations with highly-regarded artists across all art forms.

New to the Booktown program will be an evening of live music in the old Central Garage (one of the main locations in Mad Max). The corrugated iron icon will resound with music from Kee'ahn, The Idiomatics, McNaMarr Project, The Footscray Gypsy Orchestra and there will be a David Bridie album launch to cap it off.

### Locals get in free

As a local (postcode 3370) you do not have to pay to access the town over Festival weekend. Locals have never been asked to pay, and never will.

Residents of postcode 3370 can get free access by showing proof of address (bill, drivers licence etc.) at either the box office on Bailey St during the event or by visiting the Creative Clunes office at 70 Service St, Clunes between 9 and 5 from Monday – Wednesday.

Tickets for talks still have to be purchased (\$20), but festival precinct access is free.

Please be assured, if you need the newsagency or pharmacy during the Booktown weekend you will not have to pay to enter your own town!

### **Booktown's location**

We are changing the layout of the festival to make it safer for staff, volunteers and the large number of visitors, particularly those queuing at entrances. This year, both Fraser and Bailey St will be closed and the main gates moved up to the Bailey St entrance (see map for entrances and fence lines). Our two main festival ticket entrances will be in Bailey Street and in front of the Town Hall.

Traffic moving through town will be detoured with signs directing them to take the existing bypass road along Victoria and West Street between the Talbot/Maryborough Road and Service Street.

### When do roads close?

Bailey Street and Fraser Street will be closed to all through traffic from 8am Thursday 23 March 2023 to 12pm Monday 27 March 2023. Fraser St between the intersections of Service Street and Templeton Street and Bailey St in front of the town hall. Speed restrictions will also be in force for vehicles travelling through Clunes on major thoroughfares. All detours and closures will be well signed.

We understand that road closures are a challenge, and we strive to minimise disruption, especially to those with limited mobility. We have done our utmost to balance the need for the shortest possible road closures, against the safety and wellbeing of our (largely) volunteer setup and pack down crew. With an event that brings 12–15,000 people to town, there's a huge amount of work required along Bailey and Fraser St to get ready in a short time.

At all times, Fraser and Bailey St will be open for free to local residents. We encourage you to grab your wristband in advance to minimise any disruption.

### **Parking**

Signage will be erected at various intersections to direct visitors vehicles to parking at:

- Clunes Showgrounds Clunes Primary School
- Community Centre Bottle Museum

Temporary accessibility parking spaces will be set up at:

- Attitude, 25 Fraser Street
- Next to the Club Hotel rear gate access
- Town Hall car park
- Beside Timmermans, behind the cenotaph

# **CTDA BUSINESS WORKSHOPS**



There's a spring in our step as the 2023 school year is well underway. The 'farm' gate (as it's known) has been closed by Willow and Heidi. The sprinklers are on in the Kitchen Garden, and our entire school has finished their Fitness session with a walk around the Walking Track or a Walk to School from Queens Park. It's a Tuesday, so Mrs Mitchell has a cooking class this morning. Garden Club will run at lunchtime and volunteer community helper, Verena, from Allendale, will actively support our learning for the afternoon.

As a Health Promoting School, there's a strong focus on developing an understanding of the need for a healthy mind and a healthy body. At 10am daily, there's a short Fruit Break and there's a pause in the literacy lesson for all students to munch on a piece of fruit or veg.

Our school has benefitted from years of forward-thinking school community members that planted an orchard of fruit trees in our school yard. Now is the season where a student has only to reach up (hopefully) to take a peach, nectarine, blood plum, apricot, nashi, apple or pear. The orchard also has pomegranates (netted at the moment) and abundant blackberries.

We rely on this fruit (and our veggies) as the base ingredients for our weekly Kitchen Garden and Cooking Program.

Each Friday parent volunteers make up a platter of fruit and veggies for each classroom. The Webb and Kenna families have managed this task for many years. Thank you!

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# **CLUNES GOLF CLUB**

The absence of any significant rain this year has really dried the course out, even to the point where the few water hazards that we had come to think of as permanent in the wetness of 2022, are now more like stinky-mud-hole hazards and even more to be avoided than previously.

We have had a pleasing influx of new members this year, both on a full playing basis and social members and it is good to see different groups enjoying the course on most days there is no club event.

How does a golf club run? Course Maintenance: As all sports clubs will know, maintenance of course/field/greens/courts etc. is a perpetual activity. There are some things that happen at the golf club on a seasonal basis – application of fertiliser and gypsum – and others whose frequency varies with the season – mowing and watering (tees only), for instance. We have 2-3 members who take on organising and completing these. Other tasks we allocate to monthly working bees where over a few hours members will descend on the course to for necessary work: tree planting; development of new garden beds; clearing fallen sticks and limbs; cleaning the club house and surrounds; new sand on the scrapes. It is a lot of work but the benefits are there to be seen in the transformation of the course.

Scoring Methods – Stroke: As the name implies, STROKE is simply the sum of the number of strokes you take to get around a course. Our course is compilation of 18 holes of varying difficulty. We have 6x Par 3, 8x Par 4 and 4x Par 5 holes, meaning the total course is Par 70. This Par rating is an indication of the number of strokes a 'scratch' golfer (with a handicap of 0) should take to complete the course.

Monthly Medal Lawrie Lees, Christine O'Donnell and Phil Johnston are our Monthly Medallists so far for 2023 and will compete with other winners for the Medallist of the Year trophy in November.

### **Coming Events**

Club Championships Qualifying Rounds March 8 and 12 are qualifying rounds for the CGC Pairs Four-Ball-Best-Ball (4BBB) Championship. The events are stableford matchplay and there will be a field of 8 for the singles (qualifying

rounds were held in February) and 4 pairs for the 4BBB championship finals.

Chicken Run: Every Thursday evening through March we will play a casual pairs event over 9 holes. We tee-off around 4:30-5:00pm with an emphasis on fun. Supper is provided and bar open after the game (around 6:30pm), and a roast or frozen chook from Clunes IGA to the winners. This is a great way to get into golf, or just relax on a Thursday evening.

Cross-Code Challenge: We are having a cross-code challenge with the Clunes Bowls Club: we will go there and play a game of bowls, and they will come to us and play a round of golf. Not sure whose gauntlet was thrown first, but ... they're both ball games so how hard could it be?

We play a regular comp every Wednesday and Sunday, tee off is 10:00am. For something less formal, CGC Ferals host a more casual interpretation of the rules over 9 holes on Monday mornings (9:00am), as well as the Chicken Run on Thursday evenings from 5:00pm. All welcome.

# THE POWER OF COLLABORATION

People and organisations alike thrive in an environment that is built on collaboration. When everybody comes together and works as one, tasks are made easier, good relationships are formed, productivity improves and sustainability is more likely.

The same outcomes occur when you collaborate in community.

Clunes has a history of collaboration that goes way back. You only need to spend time in the Clunes Museum flicking through the newspaper clippings and archives to see the evidence of a community that's regularly worked together to celebrate, progress or respond in a crisis.

History like this creates a pattern that gets replicated, generation after generation. While there might be times of disruption (even huge things like the 'P' word), the moment people have capacity or need, those old patterns kick back in – and the more they do, the better the results.

### **Strengthening Others**

Making something happen is great, but strengthening others as you do it is where the real power of collaboration is evident. Our town's experience as collaborators means we don't have to focus on 'how' we collaborate. Instead, our experience and trust means we can go that next step and look at collaborating in ways that build up others.

You don't have to look far to see some great current examples of what we mean:

Go Local Clunes: funded by Business Victoria, this project was a collaboration informed by local businesses from the very beginning. Delivered by BOOM Clunes/Clunes Neighbourhood House in collaboration with CTDA, this promotional campaign is now wrapping up. However, because the project was structured to strengthen relationships with local businesses and assist CTDA get their Business Network off the ground, the legacies from this will continue every month (see front page: CTDA workshops).

Clunes Former Free Lending Library: forget being reliant on funding or an organisation to make a difference. The story of this building's preservation is all about people power. Just a handful of community-minded (and determined) people over the generations, who scraped together to keep this building from falling down. Their work meant that last month, Clunes Neighbourhood House (for the first time in our 40-year history) moved into our very own, permanent home.


Collaboration doesn't happen by chance. In Clunes it might be in our DNA, but it's nurtured by the actions of all.


