

WHAT'S GOING ON WITH OUR POWER OUTAGES?

Yet another Clunes power cut on August 24 – unplanned and lasting over four hours – prompted us to hit up Powercor and ask them what's going on. We also asked how many outages we've experienced over the last 10 years, how long they went for and, most importantly, why.

So what did we find out?

Not enough. And we didn't receive the incident data we requested, but here's what they supplied:

"The August 24 outage affected 1300 customers following a network fault on the main backbone powerline feeding the Clunes area. Crews replaced a faulty lightning arrestor, which was identified as the cause of the outage," a Powercor spokesperson said.

Powercor said the August 24 incident was the only unplanned outage for 2023 [so far]. The company said they

had recently installed new-generation automatic circuit recloser (ACR) technology on the main powerline feeding Clunes and that "this technology responds to faults on the powerline and reduces the number of customers impacted by outages."

"The technology also helps narrow down the location of the fault, allowing our crews to respond faster. In recent weeks, we've made new upgrades to these ACRs which further reduced the outage area for the recent fault from over 6000 customers off supply, down to around 1300," the spokesperson said.

Powercor said they would "continue monitoring and continuously improve this technology to maintain reliability of supply in the area."

And we'll keep monitoring them, too.



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
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MARKET UPDATE

NO LONGER A DRAIN

During heavy rain and flooding the grounds of the Former Clunes Free Lending Library turn into a stormwater drain that has damaged the retaining wall and impacted foundations. Wet weather, especially during winter, makes the grounds slippery and difficult to traverse. But not anymore.

With the support of the Victorian State Government Committees of Management Flood Recoveries Grant, Clunes Neighbourhood House has secured the funding to rectify these drainage issues and transform the grounds into a functional community space. Concept drawings combining critical earthworks with smart design have been finalised (see www.clunesnh.org) to ensure that when Clunes Neighbourhood House reopens the building, activities can happen inside and out.

Disability Access Consultation


Excitingly, the Hugh D.T. Williamson Foundation has offered to take these works one step further by providing funds to include disability access to the building.

Disability access is complex at best, but even more so when it comes to heritage buildings. True inclusivity means welcoming all people through your front door, but how do you do that when you have a heritage frontage and a steep incline? We've turned to Europe for inspiration. An ancient continent, Europe offers many examples of disability access that don't require structural changes to buildings and which 'fade' into the background, so the focus remains of the historical facade.

To do this we need to go through multiple approval processes before we can construct a ramp and we'd love your help to:

- 1. Gain your feedback on our proposed design (have we got it right?)
- 2. Highlight the need (so if you'd have difficulty accessing the building as it currently is let us know!)
- 3. Advocate for a footpath and disability park (the more names we have supporting this the better!)

Ya Ya's Red Door sells an eclectic mix of new and old goods. The shop is also home to Rod Tregear's Art and The Sock Maker.

Located at the western end of Fraser Street, Ya Ya's may feel like it's off the beaten track, but it is certainly worth crossing Templeton Street to visit Kay, Rod, and Janine, the three business owners operating from this lovingly-restored premises. A look on Google maps will show you just how far this building has come in recent years. Once an eyesore, it is now a little gem shining brightly at the far end of Fraser Street and providing opportunities for two small business owners, besides Ya Ya's, which is owned and run by Kay.

Kay loves supporting creatives, and this is apparent in the welcoming presence of The Sock Maker and Rod Tregear, artist in residence. A friendly and delightful place (as one customer cheerfully volunteered on hearing my conversation with Kay), Ya Ya's is perfect if you love rummaging through vintage, new, and recycled goods. Seated by the window looking out onto the garden, Rod Tregear paints postcards and displays his nautical scenes and delicate bird studies. Janine, The Sock Maker, sits opposite, making her hand-cranked socks. Australian grown and made (from

Janine's own flock), her socks bearing the Australian Fibre Collective trademark are 100% Clunes. They are also exquisitely soft and dyed beautiful natural colours. If you like the brighter side of things, Janine, like Kay, loves to recycle and now offers socks and beanies made from upcycled and vintage yarns. Saving vintage jumpers from landfill by wearing these colourful socks isn't just about doing your part for the environment; the socks have their own personality. As Janine says, the machine dictates which colours come to the fore; you never know what you are going to get.

It's a quality that shines throughout Ya Ya's: vintage, new, hand-crafted delightful surprises – that's what you'll find behind the red door.



When the dust settled at the end of the event, only Allan Worthington, with a mixture of the two approaches, had been able to catch Dean. This has not happened previously, and Allan and Dean will play a fourth eclectic round to decide the 2023 Eclectic Champion.

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VALE GRAEME JOHNSTONE AND RON KOMISARS

Clunes lost two of our best in August with the passing of Graeme Johnstone and Ron Komisars.

Graeme was a local legend and an example of how one person can have a ripple effect on the lives of thousands. Graeme moved to Clunes in 1997 with his wife, June. Graeme was always quick to get stuck in and help our community. He served for more than 12 years on the Clunes Tourism and Development Association and represented the community on the Hepburn regional tourism board. He was instrumental in bringing the annual Words in Winter literary and arts festival to the Hepburn Shire and was one of the founding fathers of Creative Clunes and the famous annual Booktown festival established in 2007.

Graeme led the push for Clunes to be recognised as an international book town. He helped establish the biennial Clunes Ceramic Award, and he preserved the former Free Lending Library and helped it evolve into the brand new home of the Neighbourhood House.

Graeme's achievements are endless. He was a statesman, with the warmest smile and the biggest heart, who always would be seen on Fraser Street lending a hand to everyone. He gave his all to Clunes and made it a better place for so many as a result.

Ron's first connection with Clunes was coming for weekend visits to his close friends, Annie and Dennis, and spending many relaxed evenings with wine and enjoyable conversations. This ignited the love affair with the place he was soon to call home. That spark led to moving into 65 Fraser St, which then became Clementine's restaurant; famous for bringing the first espresso coffee machine to Clunes and Middle Eastern flavours. Pauline and Ron became affectionately known as the Fawlty Towers of Clunes, with many memorable nights that people still remember 20 years on.

Ron was deeply involved in the community providing catering for big events such as Booktown, and Mulberry Manse, as well as many weddings, and birthdays. It was his way of giving back.

The bowling club was a big part of his life, creating many close friendships.

Sometimes the simple connections can be the best. Ron and Pauline, along with their dog, Boris, loved sitting on Fraser Street drinking coffee and talking to anyone who walked by.

Ron's connection to Clunes gave him the opportunity to create lifelong friendships in his golden years.

Vale, Graeme and Ron. You will always be with us.

CLUNES ORGANICS BINS

Your lime-green food and garden organics bin (FOGO) will continue to be collected WEEKLY on a Monday. This service will continue until a decision is made about timing of the Shire-wide rollout of the FOGO service.

We have noticed an increase in contamination of the FOGO bin in recent months. The FOGO bin can be used to collect kitchen scraps and garden clippings. You can also put bones, dairy, fish, out-of-date food, garden clippings and small branches in this bin. Please remember not to put any plastic packaging in the bin.

Food thrown into your red landfill (general rubbish) bin ends up in landfill. Food in landfill creates significant greenhouse gases that contribute to climate change. Kitchen scraps and garden clippings in your FOGO bin are turned into compost, which helps to conserve our valuable resources and minimise greenhouse gases.

Keep your eye out for a chance to collect bags of compost made from Clunes township organic collection material, composted locally at the in-vessel compost units in Creswick.
